



John was born March 10, 1928 at the village of Sleepy Hollow in Grand Fork B.C. to Paul and Helen Zibin. He received his schooling at the Fructova School learning to read and write in both English and Russian. John was also involved in the USCC community activities and men's choir. As a boy John went to work in the fields on various farms in Grand Forks. His father died when John was seven years of age and at the age of eleven he went out to work accompanied by his grandmother to help to provide for the household. As a teenager he worked away in the Okanagan orchards.

John acquired a love of music and played various instruments; accordion, harmonica, guitar, violin and mandolin. He played with friends at dances and entertained at the packing houses in Grand Forks as well as the Okanagan.

When John returned to Sleepy Hollow, he met and started courting Florence Seminoff. They fell in love and married on May 3, 1952.

After their marriage John and Florence set up their own home in Sleepy Hollow and saw the birth of their son Steve in October 1953, daughter Betty in March 1956, and son Johnnie, September 1958. In 1959 the family moved to West Grand Forks to their newly built home where the youngest daughter Shelly was born in November of 1963.

John studied to obtain his ticket in heavy duty mechanics, and then spent most of his adult life working in the logging industry. When John was working in the logging camps he ran a jammer, which was the predecessor machine to log yarders. In 1958 John joined his uncle Fred Zibin and started their own logging company called Zibin Contracting. Here he stayed until the company sold. In 1975 he went to work for Pope and

Talbot. John was offered the position of logging supervisor, however he chose to work as a cat operator until his retirement in 1993.

Throughout the years John and Florence enjoyed camping, and travelling to various vacation destinations including Hawaii, Mexico, Jamaica and Cuba.

In his retirement he enjoyed gardening and especially spending time with his children, grandchildren and great grandchildren.

John lived at home until his health declined and was hospitalized in May of this year. He passed away in his 84th year on June 17, 2012 under the loving watch of his family.

John was predeceased by his father and mother and daughter Shelly. John is survived by Florence, his wife of 60 years, son Steve Zibin and wife, Debbie, son John Zibin and Connie, and daughter Betty Gelter and husband Jeff; his nine grandchildren: Vanessa, Christa, Justin, Vicki, Audra, Drew, Colleen, Amanda and Quentyn; and great grandchildren Ethan and Anna. Also surviving John is one brother, Mitch Zibin of Grand Forks and one sister Polly Sherbinin of Trail, and many nieces and nephews.

John was a hardworking and caring man who loved his family very much. He was a lifetime member of the USCC.

John will be greatly missed by family and friends.
